

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

The Dreyfus Affair, Proust, and Social Psychology Moscovici 1986



- Gedankenexperiments: to study imaginary groups as if they were real ones
 - a. the relationships, emotions, behaviour described in fiction might be conveniently interpreted through social-psychological models
 - b. fiction may be used as a source of theoretical thought, by examining the writers' implicit worldview
 - c. specific contributions by authors who use social-psychological theories as a starting points for their novels are precious

Chombart de Lauwe 1971



- Representations of the child and childhood as an 'excellent projective test' of the values and aspirations system within a society
- A syncronic and diacronic study:
 - Change of the representations offered by adults to adults along one century

Material

- Wide selection of literary material (novels and autobiografies cf. Appendix, with some *short stories* and scripts of films):
 - Great writers (Victor Hugo)
 - Writers on childhood
 - Successful authors in their times, then forgotten
- More than one hundred oeouvres, later reduced to:
 - 25 before WWI
 - 25 between the two wars
 - 25 after WWI

Mapping and analysing everyday life - a 'structuring structure supporting, allowing and connecting all the other spheres of reality' (Emiliani, 2008)



Narrative Analysis



- "...narrative is an oral, written, or filmed account of events told to others or to oneself (monologue) but is not verbal material that is purely descriptive, expository.., disconnected or abstract. For our purposes narrative is used to refer to accounts of personal experience, or the experiences of others, or to fictional accounts, such as stories, myths, folktales and fairy tales." (Smith, 2000)
- ...not searching for literal truth but narrative truth




A famous "ancestor": Propp and the morphology of fairy tales


"The narrative approach to social representations processes puts forwards a model of social knowledge in which anchoring and objectification of new, unfamiliar phenomena are intimately related to those aspects of categories, that enable them to be parts of coherent, culturally acceptable narratives.

Further, individual or group placements with regard to this shared systems of meanings are also held to be best understood by exploring how people locate these categories in narrative context.

Finally, individual and collective stories jointly provide a 'thick narration' of phenomena which then can be analytically scrutinized"



Narrative psychological content analysis *NPCA*




- "A model that aspires to explore the psychological meanings of narratives not only at the level of words or themes but also at the level of narrative, along the lines of narrative qualities like structure, organization, perspective, temporal relations and coherence"
- "narrative contains a finite number of structural or compositional 'slots' that can be filled with an equally finite number of psychological meaningful contents, while the surface text may show infinite variety"




- In search for basic units:


SR of national identity in historical novels Làszlò et al., 2002; 2003



- Analysis of Hungarian historical novels:
- 1. The Stars of Eger
- 2. Sons of the Cold-hearted Man
- 3. Golden Age of Transylvania



SR of national identity in historical novels Làszlò et al., 2002; 2003



- Analysis of main characters and of their actions:
- 1. Strength, knowledge, wisdom, moral excellence
- 2. Courage, honesty, helping and democratic leadership naivety, passivity and obedience
- Method: Qualitative content analyses, supported by Atlas.ti, both at a word-level and at a higher concept-level to detect characters' traits & values and the outcome of their deeds







- Analysis of coping strategies:
 - 3. Resistance, compliance, confrontation with acting out, evasion, negotiated compliance

The novel "follows the pattern of we lost but we won [coming to] reinforce and transmit a coping strategy characteristic of the Hungarian culture, i.e. transforming real defeat in a moral victory"



Macro-categories in the description of the hero









Macro-categories in the description of antagonist in Under the Yoke – Qualitative CA – Atlas.ti








Discourse and representation in the construction of Withcraft Wagner 2008



- Analysis of Arthur Miller's play.
- From tracing and depicting social representations as static units to the analysis of discursive unfolding which anticipates and produces institutionalized outcomes. Careful reading of the text allows to highlight the passage from a consensual space to a reified form of social thinking.




Discourse and representation in the construction of Withcraft Wagner 2008



- Different kinds and practices of discourse
- "It is here, in the institutionalized setting and in the related talk, that one can most easily identify a representation of witchcraft, which would easily have escaped the attention of a researcher in the initial, consensual, village life"

Research Questions




- How is friendship depicted in the novel?





Desai's Clear Light of Day







Concluding remarks



- Along these five decades, literary texts have been employed in SR research mainly as
- protocols of observations to highlight the frame of mind of a period
- to study the dynamics of imaginary groups exactly as if they were real groups
- The narrative and discursive turn offer precious indications and instruments ... and the dialogical? (Jesuino, 2015)
- Also a classic approach, open to possible extensions, may provide empirical assessment and theoretical advancement in social representations research.



Further steps



From overview to review ... perhaps also in relation with iconic (cf. de Rosa, 2014) or cinematographic language (e.g. Brodesco, 2013)

Analyses of texts and readers' interpretation (e.g. Nencini, 2011)

Conjunctivization ... possible worlds ... from mirroring to making.. research for future forming (listening to/contributing to shape a variety of – less widely recognized – voices) (Gergen, in press; Jovchelovitch, 2013).




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
