

Geographic map




Official map of... FYROM

Brief timeline

1991

Nouvelle Yougoslavie

□ 17 February : The Parliament in Skopje **changes the name** "Socialist Republic of Macedonia" to "**Republic of Macedonia**".

8 September: **Referendum** on the future status of the "Republic of Macedonia": Voters were asked whether they were "in favour a sovereign Macedonian state, with the right to participate in a future union of Yugoslav states": **95.05% voted YES**.

13 November: The Greek government spokesman states that "Greece does not intend to recognise an independent state with the historically Greek name of Macedonia".

16 December: An extraordinary EU Council of Foreign Ministers meets in Brussels. It **accepts the disintegration of Yugoslavia** as a fait accompli and decides to **recognise** the independence of former Yugoslav republics subject to the following three terms:

"to commit itself, prior to recognition, adopt constitutional and political guarantees ensuring that it has **no territorial claims** towards a neighbouring Community state,

2. that it will conduct **no hostile propaganda** activities versus a neighbouring Community state.

3. including the **use of a denomination** which implies territorial claims".



Brief timeline

□ 1995: normalisation of relations

■ 13 September : **An Interim Agreement between Greece and FYROM** is signed in New York.

AGREEMENT

- 1. each side shall respect the territorial integrity and political independence of the other and reaffirms the inviolability of their international borders;
- 2. Greece shall recognise FYROM as an independent and sovereign state; the two governments shall establish liaison offices at the respective capitals;
- 3. FYROM shall refrain from using in any way the symbol which is now its flag;
- 4. FYROM shall provide specific and binding assurances that its Constitution will conform to the principles of international law and good neighbourly relations;
- 5. freedom of movement of people and goods is restored between the two countries.

Questions

- Our aims were related to this refusal and the argumentary forms justifying it from an identitary point of view.
 - Importance of names in the process of representations of self/other
 - process of an ideal construction, a quasi-mythical setting of the historical memory of the national group
- At the same time, we were interested, from the synchronic point of view, on
 - The epiphenomena of the macedonian problem into the greek society
 - its traces into the recent national memory
 - and into the social representations of the "other" (state, people, region)

Theoretical schema

- Beyond ordinary groups: the nation
 - A nation is the largest, the most complex and abstract human membership group; and it is also a group which seems to be able to command at times a greater intensity of attachment than any other. (Tajfel, 1969)
- Beyond etiquettes: the power of names
 - "(...) une chose non-classifiée et non-nommée est étrangère, inexistante et en même temps menaçante" (Moscovici, 1984)
- Cultural memory/myths/social communication
 - "...Modern myth as a message is discontinuous: it doesn't appear in long narratives but only in discourse; it is a phraseology, a corpus of phrases; myth disappears but the mythical stays present."(Barthes, 1973).



The textbook on history

The Macedonia, History and Politics

textbook by the Greek Ministry of National Education and Religion, 1st edition 1992.

- □ ... the Roman colonists were gradually hellenised. ...
- □ the fundamentally Greek population of Macedonia remained effectively unchanged until the 7th century A.D., when various Slav races began to settle in the area of Macedonia.
- □ For a long time the Slavs lived peacefully in the European provinces of the Byzantine Empire and, as can be seen from Byzantine writers, **many of them were hellenised**....
- However, this short-lived empire, which preceded the Ottoman conquest of the Balkans, had no effective impact on the ethnological nature of Macedonia,
- ...With the support and guidance of the Greek clergy, the Christian masses of Macedonia acquired a consciousness of their Greek identity....The First World War which followed the Asia Minor campaign and its dramatic conclusion were to cause widespread movements of population which stabilised the national homogeneity of Greek Macedonia.
- In the period of sustained warfare (1912-1919) tens of thousands of Bulgarians left, and this shift was completed with the departure of a further 53,000 Bulgarians by virtue of the voluntary exchange of populations between Greece and Bulgaria. This left only the Slav-speakers principally in Western Macedonia, most of whom had a Greek national consciousness....In Greek Macedonia, the revolutionary ethnological developments led to the emergence of homogeneously Greek population, with only sparse alien elements mainly in border districts.

The Macedonia, History and Politics (2)

- ...Overlooking the fact that the Slav-speakers who had chosen to remain in Greece **thought of themselves largely as Greeks**,
- □ ...During this period some of the **Slav-speakers underwent a crisis of consciousness**.
- ...The ethnological composition of Greek Macedonia, (...) is today homogeneous to an extent rare for the Balkan peninsula. ...
- A second reason to which particular attention should be paid is the **sensitivity of the Greeks** towards the historical continuity of their race since antiquity through medieval Byzantium down to the present.
- □ It is quite natural that the Greeks, a historic people, should be particularly sensitive towards anything tampering with their historical heritage.

The Macedonia, History and Politics (3)

- □ The recognition of a state with a concrete name gives the right to its citizens and only to them to use it. If the right to call their country as Macedonia is given to the Skopjians and also to call themselfs as Macedonians, we, the Greeks-Macedonians, will not be able to use a second national characteristic (a part from Greece-Greek) that associates us with the history of Macedonia which is the history of hellenism.

The interviews/focus groups

Individual interview (Greek/macedonian)

R. The name Macedonia it is something which belongs <u>exclusively</u> to the Greeks and even if the name had been given to another people it would never have the <u>same contents</u> as it has for us. We, we are related to the name Macedonia, we <u>lived</u> things, we have a whole <u>history</u>. Skopjiens or any people cannot use it and it will not have the same <u>significances</u> as those which it has for us. And even if finally they will use it, for us it is something very particular, while for them... For them it is only one name which they chose in the <u>dictionaries</u> and which want to use. It does not have the historical and political value and as it has for us.

A historically charged name

Lz/T: The name Macedonia is so historically charged that it is undoubtedly impossible to use it on a geographical basis. When I pronounce the name "Macedonia", it is charged 95% historically and 5% geographically. And I do not speak about his various departments, nor of the republic in north. I want to say that it is an idea, an idea in the sens of the history. It is difficult to conceive it geographically.

What's in a name?

- The uniqueness and immence pragmatic convenience of proper names in our language lie precisely in the fact that they enable us to refer publicly to objects without being forced to raise issues and come to argeement on what descriptive characteristcs exactly constitute the identity of the object. They function not as descriptions, but as pegs on which to hang descriptions. Thus the looseness of the criteria for proper names is a necessary condition for isolating the referring function from the describing of language.

An undesirable homophony

Chr/A: But you know, the problem it is that Greece, finally I mean, the word $[\mathbf{E}\lambda\lambda\dot{\alpha}\varsigma]$ you hear it and you read it in the foreign press like "**Greece**". While the word "**Makeδονία**" (in greek) you hear it like such: **Macedonia** [in english]. Here is the problem. You hear the word exactly such as it is.

Principles of use of the name

- □ right to the <u>exclusiveness</u> in the name that only its owner has
- **primacy** as regards the name which results in an archaeology of the membership
- the **consubstantiality**, namely the inseparable between the Greece-Macedonia couple. The non-observance (or even the violation) of this principle, of this tautology, between Greece and Macedonia, risk to confuse, make similar the two people.

A national identity which comes by far

"If we don't accept a part of mythology, if we don't accept that mythology contains some truths, we can not accept the greek nation. We can not accept it as an ethnically-based nation. Mythology is a essential part of greek oral tradition. Since recently it has been transferred mouth to mouth. ...I think that a large part of greek tradition, ancient or modern, is based on oral discourse. Everything that has been transferred mouth to mouth and nobody had the brilliant idea to write, on the other hand, nobody has ever claimed that the Iliad or the Odyssey where fictional events, that where? epical works where Greeks didn't fight each others."

Three symbolic fonctions of the name: synonymy, metaphor, reminiscence

■ Fonction of synonymy


Fonction of metaphor

Alexandre représente pour moi un argument indéfectible. C'est l'histoire même. L'histoire grecque. C'est le meilleur argument. Il est à nous et non à eux.

Fonction of reminiscence

- On criait des slogans pendant les manifs comme "Alexandre est vivant"

Figures of some very special neighbors...

Albanians: poor, robbers, uncultivated /not-civilized, malignant, underdeveloped, malicious, combative

Athenes

■ Turks: warriors, imperialists, chauvinist, provocative, hard, ugly, nationalist and religious, violent ones, barbarians, underhand, fanatic, chauvinist, nationalist

■ Greeks and Italians: beautiful, romantic, sensitive, generous, jovial fellows and cultivated; (gangster and liars for the Italians, and lazy for the Greeks)

Thessaloniki

■Bulgarians and Fyrom : patriots, nice, hospital, but also hostile, arrogant and oppressed.

Anchoring

- serves to weave kinship ties between the **new** significances resulting from the social sphere and the reserve of knowledge **already existing**, culturally available and accessible.
- It is brought up to date by :
 - need for undervaluing the share of uncertainty contained in the novelty
 - to cope with the unknown which the novelty represents
 - the desire for reducing the *vacuum* of comprehension and communication in connection with this novelty.

Familiarization

- Social "thirst" for familiarization
- Progressive integration
 - □ priority (*time*)
 - value (assessment)
 - hierarchy (*classification*)
 - name (*naming*)

Two visions of anchoring

- □ **Conservative** vision : **normative** meta-system
 - mechanical incorporation,
 - dynamics of change directed towards the interior,
 - passive transmission
- □ **Idealist** vision : **pacifying** receptacle/mechanism
 - confer on the category its novelty,
 - transform partially the prototype,
 - active transmission of change

Beyond familiar

- Politics of incorporation
- « Positive » familiarisation
- What can we do/say with « impossible » familiarisations ?
 - Alterity (for ex. racism, nationalism, xenophobia)
 - Sensible historical transmissions

Hypothesis

- familiarisation traditionally allotted to anchoring can also function in the opposite sense :
 - transmitting the non-familiar
 - guaranteeing the non-familiar
 - making sure that the non-familiar remainder thus
 - instituting strangeness


